THINK BACK-TO-SCHOOL!

It's never too early to start thinking about the back-to-school needs of the children at Acacia Elementary School! Acacia is a Title I school with over 90% of the families at or below the poverty level. It is also the largest elementary school in Washington District with over 920 students in K-6 grades.

Each student in grades 2 – 6 needs 4 spiral notebooks, wide rule or college rule. Each student uses one notebook for specific classes or groups of classes such as Math, English, Science, etc. Students in all grade levels need pencils, colored pencils, crayons, colored chalk, regular point scissors, erasers, glue sticks, dry erase markers, ball point pens, glue sticks, etc.

Boxes of Kleenex® type tissue and hand sanitizer are bonus items for the teachers as these are not provided by the school district. Teachers provide these products on their own and with so many little runny noses and sick kids, the teachers go through their supply quickly.

Watch for Back-to-School special ads during July and August from stores such as Big Lots, Walmart, Staples, Fry's Food Stores, etc. for great buys on Back-to-School supplies. PIONEERS AWARD BICYCLES TO STUDENTS - MAY 2018

At the end of each school year, Phoenix Thunderbird Club awards 8 bicycles to students at Acacia Elementary School, 3021 W. Evans Drive, Phoenix, who have met certain reading achievements. Any and all students may participate in a "Read to Ride" program. Since this program was started by Phoenix Thunderbird Club Pioneers in 2011, over fifty-eight bicycles have been awarded to students. Throughout the year, bicycles are either purchased by the Club by taking advantage of sale prices or are donated to the Club. Each bicycle is presented with a bike safety helmet and bicycle lock.

Students read grade appropriate books throughout the school year and take a test about each book read. Students who pass the tests are awarded **AR*** points. When a student receives X-number of AR points, their name is put in a drawing for the bicycles. The more AR points a student receives, the more times the student's name is entered in the drawing.

At a school assembly near the end of the school year, names are randomly drawn, announced and the happy winners are awarded their new bicycles. The excitement of the students at the school assembly for the drawings is incredible! For many students this is the first bike they have ever owned.

Testings administered by the state have shown reading scores and reading comprehension have improved each year since Phoenix Thunderbird Club started our reading program and these improved scores have contributed to Acacia's A++ rating. Yay Pioneers!

- *AR (Accelerated Reader) is a supplemental program used by Acacia to help students with reading success. Accelerated Reader, in total, has 155 research studies and reviews to support the effectiveness of this program.
 - Students choose books at their appropriate reading levels and read them at their own pace.
 - Students then take a quiz. Acacia has a quiz on the computer for each library book to help motivate and monitor students' reading performance and vocabulary growth.
 - When students pass three quizzes in the same range, they are moved up to their next level range.
 - Students earn prizes at predetermined benchmarks and join the dance party every week with the principal. And for 8 lucky winners a new bicycle from Pioneers!
